Dear Church Family,

The Adult Sunday School class that meets in the Fellowship Hall has been reading Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol* since November 24. We are actually using a study guide that comes with the complete text and then study questions.

Like a lot of people, I am a huge fan of Dickens' beloved story. Several years ago Audrey bought me a really nice illustrated version of the story. It's one of my favorite books in my collection now.

One of the passages I love the best from the story occurs during Scrooge's visit with the Ghost of Christmas Past. It's the scene where his fiancée calls off their engagement because she is convinced he no longer loves her. Somewhere along the way, according to the fiancée, Scrooge fell in love with money. Or as she finally says to Scrooge: "You fear the world too much. All your hopes have merged into the hope of being beyond the chance of its sordid reproach. I have seen your nobler aspirations fall off one by one, until the master passion, Gain, engrosses you."

In his marvelous book *Forgetting Ourselves on Purpose: Vocation and the Ethics of Ambition*, Brain Mahan says we all carry within us a "shadow government" of compassion and idealism. Meaning, as we get older and life experiences take their inevitable toll on us, we lose the sense of idealism and compassion that was so easy to have when younger. But, Mahan argues, that idealism hasn't been totally destroyed or overrun. Rather, it's simply been "exiled" into the deepest parts of ourselves. The trick, claims Mahan, is to recover that sense of idealism and compassion.

Well, that surely explains why I love Christmas so much. Because for me, Christmas allows me to recover that sense of idealism and compassion that life just naturally has a way of nibbling away bit-by-bit. "At Christmas time" wrote Frederick Buechner, "it is hard even for the unbeliever not to believe in something, if not everything. Peace on earth, good will to [people]...For a moment or two, the darkness of discernment, cynicism, doubt, draw back at least a little, and all the usual worldly witcheries lose something of their power to charm."

Well, may everyone have such a Christmas this year! May all the worldly witcheries (and there are many!) draw back, if only for a moment or two, and allow you to recover that sense of idealism and compassion you had when younger. And then hold onto that idealism and compassion fiercely. For changing the world, it seems to me, first starts with a dream above all else.

Christmas Is Coming

Can you believe it! Christmas is coming soon. Just a few more days and the holiday season will be in full swing. It hardly seems possible; why, the memories and images from last year are still so fresh and clear in my mind. All the visitors, all the laughter, all the meals, the presents, the entire family sitting together in church on Christmas Eve—yet, it is that time again. At least, it is that time again for many of us. Christmas is not universal.

As an occasion for merchandising Christmas is almost universal. Even in nations where Christians are only a minority of the population, the business of Christmas is important. Many years ago our daughter had a pen-pal in Japan; he was a Buddhist, but he celebrated Christmas as a time of fun and gift-giving. Bethlehem is not a town in which the majority of the population is Christian, but Christmas is important to their economy because of the number of visitors who come there at that time. In our town Christmas decorations crowd the store shelves alongside Autumn merchandise. Even before Thanksgiving some houses have wreaths and lights on display.

Oddly, Christmas is not universally observed even in our churches.

Since 1968 whenever Christmas fell on a Sunday, I traveled to lead the worship service at a church. As I drove, sometimes a round-trip of 250 miles, I would pass many churches that were closed; they were taking Christmas as a "day off."

There are some church groups that do not observe Christmas at all because, they say, there is no evidence in the Bible that Christ was born on December 25. They are right. However, we do not celebrate a day; we commemorate an event.

Christmas reminds us that God so loved the world that he gave His only begotten Son that whoever believed in Him would have everlasting life.

The celebration of Christmas is coming in just a few days, but for Christians every day should be a celebration of what God has done. There should be a perpetual Christmas in our heart.

The Word became flesh, and dwelled among us.

Merry Christmas!

Here's the magical imagination of a child! It's my 4-year-old granddaughter, who spent much time in her early years in a restaurant in Fayetteville, owned by my son and his wife.

"Order, please," she said, with a pretend notepad and marker in her hands.

"I'll have the fried catfish, please, since that is a specialty of your restaurant."

She went to her pretend kitchen and returned with a plate of plastic food.

"Yummy," I said, pretending to eat. "This is absolutely the best catfish I've ever had."

"PATCAKE" (the name my grandchildren call me), she said, rolling her eyes, that is <u>not</u> catfish!"

"Oh . . . what is it?"

At that point she launched into her story. "Well, you can't eat catfish because we don't have any catfish. The restaurant got really busy today. Everyone wanted catfish. So we fixed lots of catfish. Piles and piles of catfish, as tall as the sky. Then a giant, giant monster came. He ate up all the catfish. Then the restaurant caught on fire and the monster ran away."

Then the little storyteller said matter-of-factly as she walked away, "And that's why Jesus had to move in with us."

"Wait, what?" I said, stunned by this sudden twist of plot. "Jesus had to move in with us?"

"Yes," she replied. Then she cleared my dishes and went back to her play kitchen.

Incarnational theology in the magical words of a child! Isn't "Jesus moved in with us" just a different way of saying: "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us (John 1:14)?

When your catfish is eaten by monsters, when your restaurant burns down, when your life get turned upside down, Jesus is there. When we face hardship, injustice, division, grief, loss, and uncertainty, Jesus is there.

As we move closer to Christmas and the celebration of Jesus' birth, we can find comfort in the mystery of the incarnation – that God chose to come down to this messy, chaotic, broken, and wounded world to live with us.

I love the beauty and implications of the different translations of John 1:14.

- "The Word became flesh and made his home among us."
 (CEB)
- "And the Word became flesh and lived among us." (NRSV)
- "The Word became a human being." (NIRV)
- "And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us. (KJV)
- "The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighborhood. (MSG)
- "That's why Jesus had to move in with us." (Granddaughter Version)

No matter which translation means the most to you, the truth remains: Jesus has moved into this world, into our neighborhood, and into our homes.

The news cycle has been hard to bear. It's tempting to keep our heads down, to turn off the television, and to turn on the holiday cheer. Social media drives stories of trauma and tragedy into our minds, and it's more difficult than ever to sort lies we should ignore from truths we cannot evade. Our hearts are burdened by violence we witness in nations far away and in neighborhoods close to

home. We grieve the suffering, but are reminded of our hope in a baby born in Bethlehem.

"This is no time for a child to be born," writes the poet Madeleine L'Engle, "with the earth betrayed by war and hate." L'Engle wrote those Christmas words in 1973 after the Vietnam War formally ended and the Watergate scandal was unfolding around President Richard Nixon. What might she write today with wars raging, polarized political parties, climate change wreaking havoc on God's good creation? This is not a time for a child to be born. And yet, the poem ends, "Love still takes the risk of birth." "The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into our neighborhood. (The Message)

We often treat Christmas as an end. But Christmas is new hope. not an end. It is a time to focus outwards as well as inward. We celebrate Jesus' first advent, with an eye towards his second, the way God is actively at work redeeming and renewing our world. God has a purpose for us, and a vision. We are not helpless in the face of tragedy. We are God's instruments in the world, here to recognize sadness and create joy. We are here to reach our hands toward our neighbors and share the light we carry. The baby we celebrate this Christmas is our Savior. God with us through the struggle, God with us in despair, God with us in the work for justice and peace. A new day is coming. Love risks being born. Christmas is just the beginning because "Jesus moved in with us."

December Holiday Events -

The mission committee is offering our congregation a fellowship event as well as a giving event this December to get you in the holiday spirit.

Holiday Tasting and Advent Festival: The Mission Committee and Christian Education Committee are teaming up to host a combined Holiday Tasting and Advent Festival on December 8.

Join your church family immediately after church in the Williams Family Center for lunch and Advent-related activities. The congregation is asked to bring your favorite holiday treat—this can be savory or sweet. Bring your favorite casserole, appetizer, wintertime soup, finger food, candy, cake, pie, etc.—if you like it, your church friends will also like it. Please bring food items cooked and plated. The mission committee will be providing holiday inspired drinks.

There will be an Advent litany during lunch followed by time for everyone to participate in a number of Advent/Christmasthemed activities.

After you're done eating, you can shop for a special Christmas gift for someone you know - that has everything they need – by shopping our **Alternative Giving** opportunity. You can honor a family member or friend with a gift and help a local charitable organization at the same time by providing a donation in their honor.

We'll also be continuing the Alternative Giving opportunity on Sunday December 15. The Alternative Giving displays will be moved into the Fellowship Hall.

Christmas"Basket" Shopping:

The Mission Committee will be holding our annual Christmas "Basket" Shopping Event Saturday, December 21. We'll be inviting folks from our community to come to our church to "shop" for what food they want and will use. The Mission Committee switched to the shopping experience last year to provide the guests more dignity and waste less food (Folks only take what they want and will use). Last year provided lots of information about the types of items that people like and prefer, so pay close attention to this year's updated list of basket items below.

We rely on the congregation to purchase most of the food, and we will also need volunteers on the day of the event to meet folks at the door, assist them in gathering food items, monitor tables of food items, hand out Christmas hams, and take bags to vehicles.

The Mission Committee requests that the congregation bring their food donation to the William Family Center during the following times:

Sunday, December 15: before or after the worship service until 6:00 p.m.

Monday, December 16 12:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. Tuesday, December 17 12:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m.

Please make sure that your donated food items are not expired.

The youth will be helping by setting up our store on Wednesday, December 18.

This year the Mission Committee will be providing both the hams and the fresh fruit.

Items for Basket

- -Crest toothpaste was preferred over Colgate.
- -Shampoo and blankets were popular.

This month's contribution to the newsletter will focus on the duties and responsibilities of our Disbursing Treasurer, Don Jones. I have included Don's snapshot of the duties he handles on behalf of our church. In his words, Don tells me he is the guy "who writes the checks". This is <u>Stewardship in</u> action.

Disbursing Treasurer

- Pay all bills associated with the operations of the church.
 This includes taxes, insurance, and recurring maintenance contract payments (pest control, HVAC maintenance)
- Manage payroll of church and Learning Place employees
- Receive summary report of total receipts from our Receiving Treasurer
- Receive reports of on-line transactions from Receiving Treasurer as they come in

 Process vouchers from committee chairpersons and reimburse members for expenses, allocating expenses to the appropriate subaccounts

As you might guess, Don and Clark Lawrence work closely together, along with Ted Elsasser and Ken Patterson, to ensure all financial matters concerning the church and church properties are covered promptly and professionally.

It should surprise no one when I tell you we need to have on hand skilled and dedicated backup people, whether it be another church member or contracted service.

In other news, you may recall the Presbyterian Board of Pensions (BOP) issued a notice to abandon their existing healthcare coverage and offered several options for church ministers and their families. The open enrollment began in October. Stephen completed his evaluation, recommended an option that provides equivalent coverage, and our committee approved his proposal.

Accordingly, Stephen and Audrey made their selections during the open enrollment and are ready to transition to new coverages beginning in January. Of course, we will make these adjustments to Stephen's terms of call for next year.

Finally, look for a proposed budget for next year to be available very soon.

"Gifts of the Magi" coming in January!

January 6 is the Twelfth Day of Christmas, the traditional date on which the Magi arrived giving gifts to the Christ child. Those wishing to participate will need to sign-up by December 15, so we can give participants the name of the "family" that will be the recipient of their "Gifts" and will allow us to get the activity going at the beginning of January.

"The Gifts of the Magi" promises to be a way of getting to know members of the church family, appreciating and encouraging them, and of brightening January days for both givers and receivers. This activity will extend the message of Christmas throughout the month.

What your heart clamors to do

We often speak of pastors as having a divine "calling." God gives them a strong sense of purpose for a specific holy role, like how Old Testament prophets were called to bring messages to God's people. But what about the rest of us? Is teaching, practicing medicine, being a plumber, writing or another non-church job also a "call"?

Martin Luther and others have said we should seek work that benefits others and for which God has given us talent. We should also treat any good work we do as a calling — be it cleaning a house or school, mending a broken leg or torn garment, or (as Luther mentioned a *father* doing — in the 1500s!) changing a baby's diaper.

Dorothy Sayers wrote that "work is not primarily a thing one does to live, but the thing one lives to do," and that "we should clamor to be engaged in work that [is] worth doing, and in which we [can] take pride." What work does your heart clamor to do? In other words, what is *your* divine call?
